You are ending Female Genital Mutilation in Benin



Agnès is just one of 200 million girls and women around the world who have undergone Female Genital Mutilation (FGM). Although the procedure happened many years ago, she still lives with the constant pain.

Progress is being made in Benin. The practice was officially outlawed almost 20 years ago and the national cutting rate is now at 13% and getting lower every day. But in rural areas, like Agnès' village, cutting is still a deeply rooted tradition.

As president of the Women's Association in her village, Agnès is a part of Cuso's Women Engaged for Human Dignity in Northern Benin project and is focused on ending the practice through education.

For Agnès, education is the key to stopping the practice once and for all. She's already seeing the impact in her village. As more girls attend and remain in school, the number of voices questioning and opposing FGM continues to grow.

You are helping build futures for refugees in Nigeria In the last few years, tens of thousands of refugees have fled unrest in Cameroon for the relative safety of neighbouring Nigeria. In partnership with the UN refugee agency, UNHCR, Cuso International has implemented a life skill and entrepreneurship training program that has helped 500 refugees and their families start or grow successful small businesses.

You are giving hope to women in Colombia



This story about Colombia starts in Venezuela, where 24-year-old Lisangel grew up. Venezuela is a country in economic and social turmoil and, as a result, has very high rates of school dropout. Lisangel, who dreamed of being an accountant, left school after seventh grade and made her way to Colombia to earn income to send back to her family.

With limited education comes limited opportunity. Lisangel ended up in an unstable job working in an internet café. She was paid less than the statutory minimum wage and had no job security. Fortunately, a client in the café noticed her precarious work environment and told her about an employability program run by Cuso International. She immediately signed up and, along with 60 other Venezuelan migrants, gained valuable business technical and soft skills.

Lisangel now has a steady job and is able to provide for her aging parents and grandmother back in Venezuela. But she hasn't given up on her dream of being an accountant. She plans to apply for a scholarship through the company she works for and go back to school to earn her degree in accounting.
