

NICARAGUA:

How your support is making room for sustainable eco-tourism

The first families who settled in the remote, forested area of San José de Palmira had almost nothing. They built simple shacks made of plastic sheets and survived off the limited crops they could grow in the region's dry, tropical climate. That was almost ten years ago. Today, Palmira is home to about 250 people who live in sturdier homes after receiving construction materials and assistance from a local nongovernmental organization. Each home was built with an extra room for locals to host tourists and generate income. But the residents of Palmira needed help getting their ecotourism industry off the ground. Thanks to your gift, that help arrived at the end of 2015.

Your support brought Jennifer Ford to Palmira as a Cuso International volunteer. With a degree in eco-tourism, she could share her knowledge with community leaders, and offer training on topics like responsible tourism, customer service, and basic accounting.

By earning an income through tourism, women and men in Palmira will no longer have to rely on deliveries of rice and beans from the government each month. They can become self-sufficient, and build better lives for themselves and future generations.

When Agatha Wambugu arrived at Assosa General Hospital in western Ethiopia, she didn't know where to begin. "There were so many things I felt I needed to do instantly," she recalled.

But before Agatha started to build better systems, she knew the first step was to build strong relationships with the local hospital staff. She recognized that change was only possible if everyone was identifying challenges and working on solutions together.

"All I could say to them was: 'Agatha is not the change, we are the change'."

With a degree in nursing and public health, Agatha wanted to use her medical skills in a community with a shortage of health professionals and infrastructure. That very opportunity presented itself through Cuso International.

Donors like you helped Agatha work side-by-side with the health staff of Assosa General Hospital to improve the quality of services – especially for mothers and their babies.



GUYANA:

You are helping youth shape their own future

Each student in Bevon Austin's class takes a turn answering the same question: "What is your dream job?"

"A doctor, miss," one boy says. "A banker, miss," another girl answers.

While most young people have dreams for their future, many don't get the chance to make their dreams come true. This is especially true in developing countries like Guyana. In fact, Guyana has had one of the highest youth unemployment rates in the Caribbean for more than 15 years.

Thanks to support from donors like you, Cuso International is helping youth in Guyana prepare for the careers they want. In partnership with Volunteer Youth Corps, we are offering career guidance classes in 11 high schools.

Alastair Henry was an ideal candidate to become Cuso International's very first volunteer in our new Indigenous programming. After all, his experience working with the Lutsel K'e Dene First Nation in the Northwest Territories is what inspired him to seek out volunteer opportunities after retiring.

"Helping others gave me the personal satisfaction and fulfillment that I was seeking my whole life," he said.

By the time Alastair began his volunteer placement in Alert Bay, British Columbia, he was a Cuso International veteran. He had already volunteered in Bangladesh and Jamaica, and could apply the lessons he learned about cultural exchange and community development to his work in B.C. As an Entrepreneurship Advisor for Reconciliation Canada, he drew on his past experience in business to help Indigenous residents of Cormorant Island develop their own small enterprises.

"You've spent a lifetime developing skills and knowledge," he said. "When you retire, you can use your experience to make a real difference in less-fortunate communities."
